## The Fund's Mission and Strategy


The mission of The Commonwealth Fund is to promote a high-performing health care system that achieves better access, improved quality, and greater efficiency, particularly for society's most vulnerable, including low-income people, the uninsured, minority Americans, young children, and elderly adults.

The Fund carries out this mandate by supporting independent research on health care issues and making grants to improve health care practice and policy. An international program in health policy and practice is designed to stimulate innovative policies and practices in the United States and other industrialized countries.

The foundation pursues its mission through four program strategies: Health Care Coverage and Access, Delivery System Reform, International Health Policy and Practice Innovations, and Health System Breakthrough Opportunities. Additional arms of the Fund's strategy include cross-cutting resources and policy analytic activities, as described below.

# The Commonwealth Fund's peer group of health care foundations is very small

- With a \$702 million endowment, the Fund was the 106<sup>th</sup> largest U.S foundation in 2013
- The Fund was the 10th largest health care-focused foundation in 2013
- The Fund was one of only 4 large foundations operating nationwide that focused primarily on improving health care access, quality, and efficiency—and controlling costs




Over the five-year period beginning on July 1, 2014, the Fund expects to spend \$176.1 million to advance its mission.

#### **HEALTH CARE COVERAGE AND ACCESS**

The number of people without health insurance in the United States climbed steadily over the past decade, rising from 37 million in 2000 to 50 million in 2010. In 2011, however, the picture

began to brighten, as the number of uninsured declined to 48.6 million people—the largest one-year drop in the past 10 years. This improvement was likely driven by an increase in the number of young adults who were enrolled in their parents' health plan, a direct result of one of the Affordable Care Act's first reforms.

The recent gains in coverage for young adults foreshadow the further progress expected once the law's major insurance provisions are fully implemented over the next few years. Millions of Americans will soon be able to enroll in private subsidized health plans offered through the new state insurance marketplaces, while others will become eligible for coverage through the Medicaid program. Many people will also benefit from a panoply of new insurance market reforms, including a new standard for essential health benefits and bans on insurers from charging people more based on health or gender or barring enrollment because of a preexisting health condition. In all, some 37 million Americans are expected to gain new or more affordable coverage over the next decade.

As the central coverage reforms go into effect, The Commonwealth Fund's **Health Care** Coverage and Access program will furnish policymakers and key stakeholders with timely analysis to inform successful implementation. Activities will include:

- Providing timely information about the law's reforms and the status of their implementation.
- Tracking enrollment and people's experiences with the new insurance options.
- Evaluating the effects of insurance reforms and state and federal innovation on the extent and quality of health coverage, access to health care, changes in employer-based coverage, affordability of premiums and out-of-pocket costs, health plan competition, innovation in insurance markets, and sustainability of the insurance marketplaces.
- Analyzing and developing national and state short-term policy solutions to address implementation issues as they arise.
- Identifying gaps in the law and its implementation that may leave some groups of people without coverage or adequate protection from costs.

#### HEALTH CARE DELIVERY SYSTEM REFORM

Health care in the United States is too often compromised by fragmentation in its delivery, by patients' limited access, and by spiraling costs.

Two groups of patients experience the problems in our health system more intensely and more regularly than any other: those with complex, long-term health care needs, and those with low incomes, often no health insurance, and few social supports. The Commonwealth Fund's new **Health Care Delivery System Reform** program focuses on these individuals, because they represent the greatest opportunity to achieve meaningful, rapid gains in the value of health care.

According to federal data, 5 percent of the U.S. population accounts for 50 percent of the nation's health care costs, and 10 percent accounts for 65 percent of total costs. High-cost patients include those with health-related functional limitations requiring not just medical care

but frequently also long-term supports and services, such as individuals with multiple, serious chronic conditions like congestive heart failure, coronary artery disease, and diabetes.

People living in poverty and without health insurance coverage—a disproportionate number of whom are members of racial or ethnic minority groups—also experience our health system's shortcomings acutely. Extensive research shows that economically and socially disadvantaged individuals have greater difficulty obtaining health care, receive lower-quality care, and have poorer health outcomes than other groups.

By prioritizing complex and vulnerable patient populations, we as a nation can target our energy and resources where the impact will likely be greatest. Moreover, improvements in care and health for these patients can catalyze improvements throughout the entire health care delivery system.

The goal of the Health Care Delivery System Reform program is to improve outcomes and lower costs for high-cost, complex and vulnerable patient populations. Work supported by the program will be governed by five strategies:

- Promoting care systems that coordinate medical care, long-term care? services, and community-based resources.
- Reforming how providers are paid for their services to encourage more coordination, better quality, and greater efficiency.
- Strengthening primary care.
- Partnering with payers, particularly Medicare and Medicaid, to test and spread effective innovations.
- Developing the physician leadership needed to address the health needs of vulnerable populations through the <u>Mongan Commonwealth Fund Fellowship in Minority Health</u> <u>Policy</u>.

# MONGAN COMMONWEALTH FUND FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM IN MINORITY HEALTH POLICY

Achieving a high-performance health care system requires dedicated physician-leaders capable of transforming care delivery and promoting policies and practices that improve access to high-quality care for vulnerable populations, including racial and ethnic minorities and economically disadvantaged groups. Since 1996, the Mongan Commonwealth Fund Fellowship Program in Minority Health Policy has played an important role in developing such leaders.

Based at Harvard Medical School under the direction of Joan Reede, M.D., Dean for Diversity and Community Partnership, the year-long fellowship offers intensive study in health policy, public health, and management for physicians committed to transforming health care delivery systems for vulnerable populations. Under the program, fellows complete academic work leading to a master of public health degree at the Harvard School of Public Health, or a master of public administration degree at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. Fellows also participate in leadership forums and seminars with nationally recognized leaders in health care delivery systems, minority health, and public policy.

Selected fellows can participate in an optional second year of practicum experience to supplement academic and leadership development training with practical experience in a health care delivery system setting, a federal or state agency, or a policy-oriented institution. The practicum is a competitive program, with a variable number of placements available each year.

#### INTERNATIONAL HEALTH POLICY & PRACTICE INNOVATIONS

Across the industrialized world, health care policymakers face mounting pressure to "bend the cost curve" while at the same time maintaining access to the latest in medical technologies, improving the quality and safety of care, and making the health system more responsive to patients' needs and preferences. How other advanced countries address these challenges should be of particular interest to the United States, which spends far more on health care—per person and as a percentage of the nation's economic output—than any other nation and yet receives less in return than most.

The Commonwealth Fund's **International Health Policy & Practice Innovations** program seeks to learn about successful approaches taken by other advanced countries to ensure access to high-quality, cost-effective health care, and then share those lessons among our peer nations. The program promotes cross-national learning by:

- Annually surveying the public, patients, and physicians in 11 countries to compare health system performance.
- Organizing an annual International Symposium on Health Care Policy, attended by health ministers and senior government officials, as well as other multinational forums.
- Sponsoring the <u>Harkness Fellowships in Health Policy and Practice</u>, which enable promising health care policy researchers and practitioners in nine countries to spend up to 12 months in the U.S. conducting policy-oriented research, gaining firsthand exposure to innovative models of health care delivery, and working with leading policy experts. The fellowship has a number of <u>international cosponsors</u>.
- Identifying and disseminating information about health care delivery system innovations abroad that might also work in the U.S.

#### **BREAKTHROUGH HEALTH CARE INNOVATIONS**

In any industry or field, a little disruption every once in a while—and, sometimes, even a major shock—can be a good thing. Whether change requires us to make a simple adjustment or to completely rethink how we approach our work, in the long run it can lead us to improvements that previously were never thought possible.

The Commonwealth Fund's new **Breakthrough Health Care Innovations** program seeks to identify and assess new ideas with the potential to disrupt the health system in a good way—by making it more responsive and more efficient, by expanding access to quality care, or by improving patient outcomes. Think of the now-ubiquitous checklist, used in hospital operating rooms and intensive care units around the country to ensure the right care is provided at the right time. Only a short time ago, checklists were considered by many doctors to be an unnecessary

burden, even a challenge to their authority. Today we know the use of checklists has saved many lives by reducing human errors that imperil patient safety.

The Breakthrough Health Care Innovations program will explore emerging technologies, care delivery processes, organizational models, incentives, and policies that could have a game-changing effect on health system performance. By bringing together innovators, users, entrepreneurs, venture capitalists and regulators, the program will facilitate the translation of these innovative ideas into practice.

In its first year, the program has focused on three areas:

- Engaging consumers in their health care through information technology.
- Next-generation provider incentives that are grounded in behavioral change theory.
- "Frugal innovations" from the developing world that may be transferable to the United States.

#### CROSS-CUTTING RESOURCES AND POLICY ANALYTIC ACTIVITIES

#### TRACKING HEALTH SYSTEM PERFORMANCE

The U.S. health system is undergoing major changes intended to expand the availability of high-quality care, achieve healthier outcomes, and lower costs. With enactment of the Affordable Care Act, the federal government in investing billions in expanded health insurance coverage and innovations in care delivery.

The Commonwealth Fund's **Tracking Health System Performance** initiative is assessing the nation's progress toward these goals, including whether the investment is yielding hoped-for gains. Building on a series of national, state, and local health system scorecards begun in 2006, the initiative provides performance benchmarks and improvement targets while helping to inform future action by policymakers and health care stakeholders.

Drawing from multiple data sources to provide key indicators of access, quality/prevention, costs, and healthy lives, the scorecards to date include:

- National Scorecard on U.S. Health System Performance (2006, 2008, 2011): compares U.S. average performance to benchmarks set within the U.S. and internationally.
- State Scorecard on Health System Performance (2007, 2009, 2014): assesses states' performance on health care relative to achievable benchmarks.
- Scorecard on Local Health System Performance (2012): compares performance in more than 300 U.S. hospital referral regions.
- Scorecard on State Health System Performance for Low-Income Populations (2013): focuses on how well states are addressing the health care needs of their low-income populations.
- State Scorecard on Long-Term Services and Supports (2011, 2014): assesses the performance of nursing homes, home health agencies, and state programs across the states. The scorecard is sponsored jointly by The Commonwealth Fund, AARP, and the SCAN Foundation.

The Commonwealth Fund supports a research team at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) to assemble health system performance tracking metrics and develop the scorecards.

In addition, the Fund supports <u>WhyNotTheBest.org</u>, an online tool that allows health care professionals and researchers to benchmark health care performance and find resources to guide their improvement efforts.

#### ADVANCING MEDICARE

For nearly five decades, Medicare has helped older adults and disabled people of all ages obtain the health care they need while protecting the most vulnerable from severe financial hardship.

The Commonwealth Fund's **Advancing Medicare** initiative identifies ways in which this crucial program—the largest single payer of health care services in the United States—can serve its beneficiaries more effectively and efficiently while helping to foster health system improvements nationwide.

Medicare has enormous capacity to leverage broader change in U.S. health care. More than 50 million aged and disabled Americans access care through the program, which accounts for a large and growing share of the federal budget (the government spends nearly \$600 billion on Medicare benefits annually, accounting for 18 percent of total federal non-interest spending). And with the creation of the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation, Medicare has a key role in the development, implementation, evaluation, and spread of innovative models of health care organization, delivery, and payment—not only for Medicare, but for other federal and state health insurance programs and private payers, too.

As Medicare approaches its 50th anniversary in 2015, The Commonwealth Fund will be studying potential solutions to the issues facing the program. The Fund and its grantees will examine how Medicare can:

- Improve access to care needed by aged and disabled beneficiaries.
- Lower program costs.
- Assess and disseminate innovations in care delivery and provider payment throughout the program and the entire health system.
- Improve coordination between Medicare and other public programs, like Medicaid.
- Work together with private insurers, particularly as the new state insurance marketplaces open for business.

Success in each of these areas will help ensure that Medicare remains a vital force in our nation's health care.

#### CONTROLLING HEALTH COSTS

The U.S. health care system is by far the most expensive in the world, consuming 18 percent of the nation's gross domestic product. That's 50 percent higher than the share of

GDP devoted to health care in the second-most-expensive country (the Netherlands) and double that in many other high-income countries.

Despite all that spending, health outcomes for Americans are often worse, while evidence of waste and inefficiency throughout the U.S. health system abounds. Evidence also shows that U.S. prices are out of line with what other developed nations pay for the same medical services, devices, and pharmaceuticals—even those produced in the United States sold on global markets. All this excess spending is putting a strain on businesses, governments, and household budgets—diverting resources away from investments in jobs, education, and other social and economic needs.

The Commonwealth Fund's **Controlling Health Costs** initiative monitors and analyzes spending in both the public and private health care sectors. It seeks answers to two central questions:

- What is driving higher or lower costs and spending in health care markets across the country?
- What policy reforms, innovations in care delivery, or changes in provider payment have the potential to reduce costs while improving outcomes in all regions?

Patients with the highest and costliest health care needs, such as people with multiple chronic conditions, are a particular emphasis of the initiative. Research efforts also focus on the cost impact of new medical technologies and changing demographics, as well as the role of prices, treatment patterns, and resource use.

It is hoped that findings from these and other analyses will inform new approaches to controlling costs that yield far better value for our health care dollars.

#### ENGAGING FEDERAL AND STATE HEALTH POLICYMAKERS

If we as a nation are to achieve fundamental improvements in our health care system, federal and state policymakers will need to take action in a coordinated fashion. As implementation of the Affordable Care Act proceeds, both the federal government and the states have roles in expanding access to affordable insurance coverage, in designing, testing, and refining new ways to deliver and pay for health care, and in ensuring that health services are delivered efficiently and equitably. Continuing budgetary pressures, moreover, have forced federal and state officials alike to prioritize the search for ways to produce better health outcomes at lower cost.


The Commonwealth Fund's Engaging Federal and State Health Policymakers initiative provides independent analysis of health care issues tailored for those serving in state and federal government. The Fund's team helps to inform and educate congressional members and staff, officials in the executive branch, state policymakers, and the broader policy community—across the political spectrum—on issues central to achieving a high-performance health system.

Through the briefings, conferences, and retreats it sponsors, the Fund's team also serves as a neutral convener, facilitating both state-to-state learning and communications between federal and state policymakers to inform policy deliberations and generate new solutions. Finally, the team also supports The Commonwealth Fund's programmatic efforts to provide policymakers with timely, balanced, evidenced-based policy research and analysis.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS**

The Fund's Communications program uses print, broadcast, online, and social media to bring information on health reform and health system transformation to the attention of critical stakeholder groups, especially policy officials and leaders in health care delivery. The foundation's *Realizing Health Reform's Potential* issue brief series enriches public understanding of how the Affordable Health Care Act will affect specific groups, including women, disabled persons, small businesses, persons with pre-existing conditions, older adults, and workers undergoing a change in employment status. A media fellowship program conducted by the Association of Health Care Journalists, encourages in-depth reporting on issues related to health system performance and change. *The Commonwealth Fund Blog* features topical analyses by staff, grantee, and external policy experts and is a major source for analysis of state health insurance exchange regulations and the status of states' progress on exchange implementation. The online Health Reform Resource Center provides a timeline of the Affordable Care Act's major provisions and an interactive tool for searching specific provisions by year of implementation, category, and stakeholder group.



### The Fund's Resources and Their Management

The Fund's human resources are as important as its financial ones. They include highly productive professional staff based in the Fund's New York City headquarters and in its Washington, D.C., and Boston offices—as well as an outstanding constellation of advisers, principal investigators on Fund grants, and members of the Fund's own Board of Directors.

Reflecting the foundation's value-added approach to grantmaking, approximately 40 percent of the total budget is devoted to intramural units engaged in research and program development, collaborations with grantees, and dissemination of program results to policymakers, health care leaders, researchers, and other influential audiences. The portion of the foundation's total budget devoted to administration is 6 percent.

Properly measured, the Fund's administrative expenses amount to 6% of the total budget. Direct public benefit activities\* and value-adding grantmaking work make up 93% of the budget.



#### THE FOUNDATION'S PERFORMANCE


The Fund aims to be a learning organization, and consequently places a high value on assessing its own performance. The foundation's annual external program reviews, annual reports to the



# Relative to its peers, the Commonwealth Fund is regarded as being very effective at framing key issues in achieving better health care access, improved quality and greater efficiency




# The Commonwealth Fund receives high ratings for providing unique information that others do not provide


# Commonwealth Fund grantees report that Fund staff involvement is useful for assuring effective project design, conduct, and communication of results

Due to risk controls in the Fund's investment strategy, in the current buoyant market the endowment has underperformed the market benchmark; but performance is well above the market's over the long term.




Periods ending June 30, 2014
