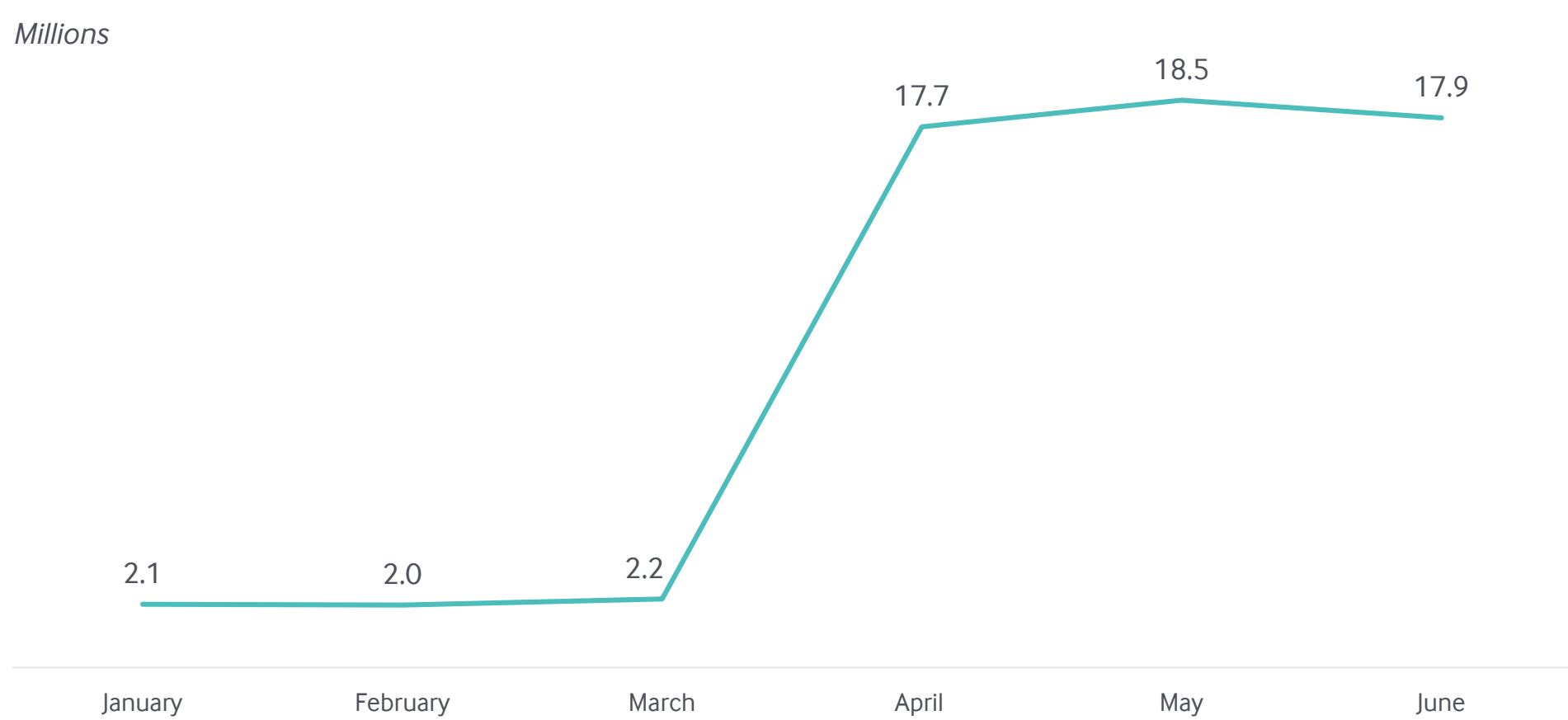


# Number of Unemployed Workers, January–June 2020

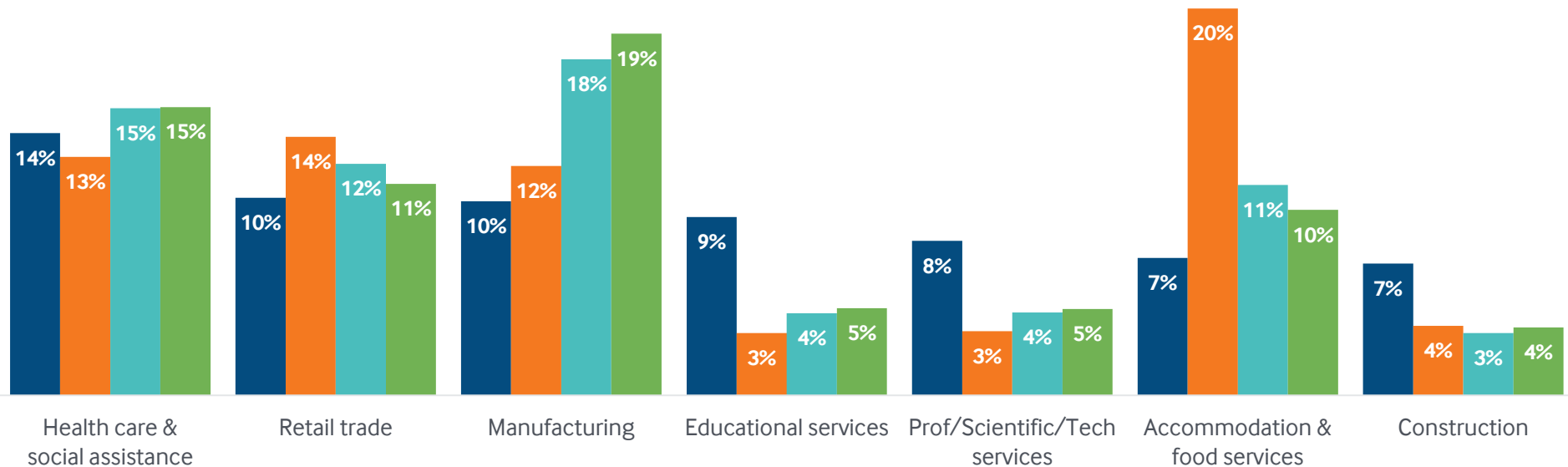

■ Employment   ■ Job losses   ■ Loss of jobs with ESI   ■ Total potentially affected

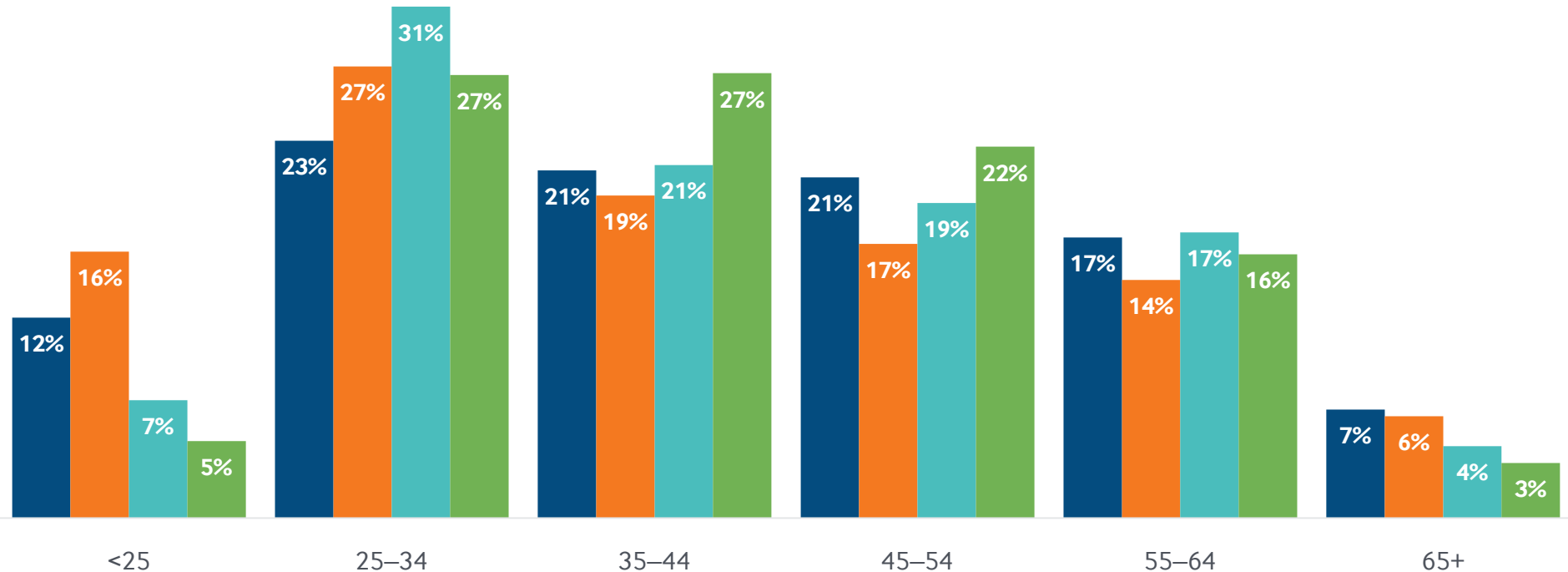


Notes: These industries account for 66% of employment prepandemic, and 69% of postpandemic job losses. ESI = employer-sponsored health insurance.

# Shares of Prepandemic Employment, June Unemployment, Loss of Jobs with ESI, and Total Potentially Affected, by Age Group

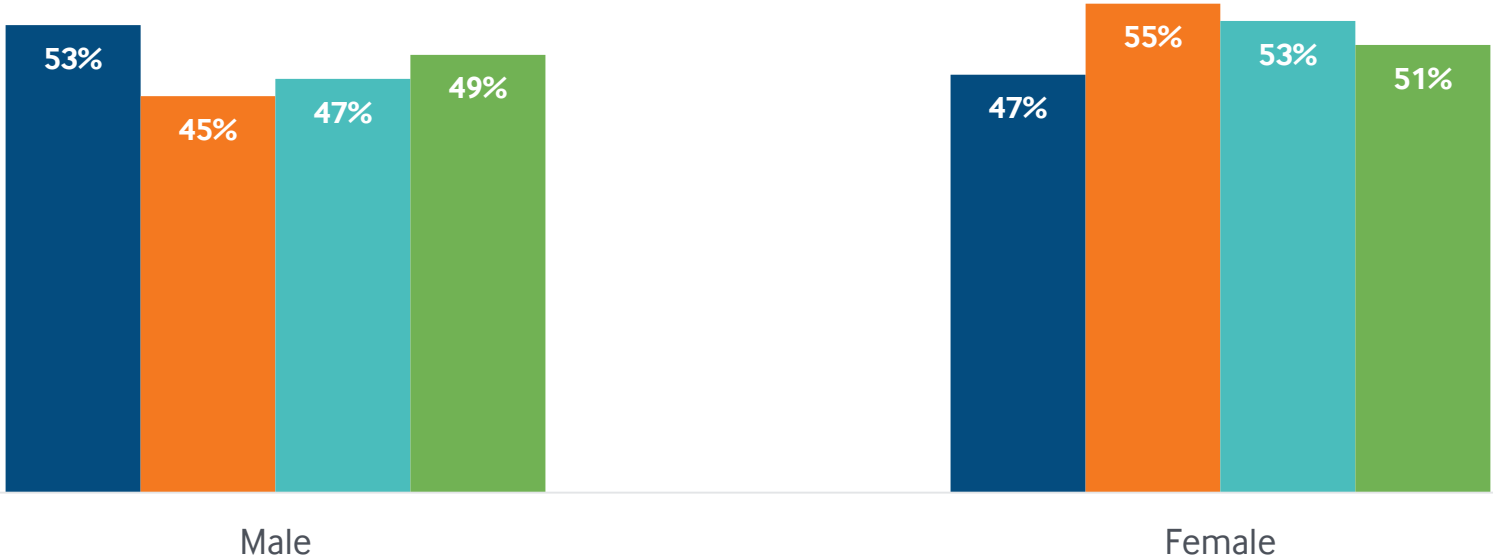
■ Employment   ■ Job losses   ■ Loss of jobs with ESI   ■ Total potentially affected
